## WORLD AFFAIRS COUNCILS OF AMERICA

The World Affairs Council of Dallas/Fort Worth is a member of the World Affairs Councils of America (WACA) network, which traces its earliest roots to 1918, when the League of Free Nations Association was formed to support President Wilson's efforts to achieve peace. At the end of World War I, the Association's founders were concerned that Americans would choose isolationism over a foreign policy based on international engagement. They worked to promote and nurture public awareness of critical international issues affecting the U.S., and in 1923 reconstituted the organization as the Foreign Policy Association. John Foster Dulles and Eleanor Roosevelt were among the FPA's incorporators.

Today, there are roughy 90 World Affairs Councils throughout the United States with a share mission. In an age of globalization and a rapidly shifting international order, we believe that our mission — engaging the public and leaders to better understand global affairs and America's role in the world — is more vital than ever.







## WACDFW HISTORY

A nonpartisan, nonprofit organization, the Council was founded in 1951 by some of the city's most prominent citizens to engage residents in global issues and position North Texas as a player on the world stage.

Founders included famed merchandiser Stanley Marcus, Dallas Mayor J. Woodall Rodgers and industrialist H. Neil Mallon, for whom our annual award is named.





The mission of the **nonprofit**, **nonpartisan** World Affairs Council of Dallas/Fort Worth (WACDFW) is to promote international awareness, understanding and connections to enhance the region's global stature and to prepare North Texans to thrive in our complex world.

WACDFW is a dynamic organization that brings international awareness and cross-cultural understanding to the North Texas community and presents distinguished international figures year-round for in-depth interpretations of global events. Today, it serves as a gateway to the world for the region, offering an impressive range of programs and events for the public and its members.

## WACDFW DEPARTMENTS

The Council coordinates visits to North Texas of delegations and leaders from around the world through the International Visitor Leadership Program, which serves as a local component to the U.S. State Department's premier professional exchange program.

#### **IVLP**

The City of Dallas' ProtocolOffice is a public/private partnership between the City of Dallas and WACDFW. The Protocol Office works with the Office of the Mayor, city officials, the diplomatic corps and other international stakeholders to represent the City of Dallas in official international activities.

#### **PROTOCOL**

Meridian members come from all professions and backgrounds, but share aco mmon interest in international topics -busin ess, culture, politics, economics and current events.

# GLOBAL YOUNG LEADERS

Global Young Leaders is an education program of the World Affairs Council of Dallas/Fort Worth that creates an intelligent pathway for North Texas high school students to achieve ambitions in international careers. The GYL program is facilitated through clubs on high school campuses called Junior World Affairs Councils (JWACs), which are available to public, private, charter, and home school.



To provide North Texas students with the tools and skills to make positive change in the North Texas community, effectively interact with people from different backgrounds, and compete for jobs in the global workforce.

GYL believes that in order to prepare the next generation of North Texas residents to compete in the global economy, they need global competence skills to solve complexproblems, create opportunities for all, and advance a shared respect for human dignity.

## JUNIOR WORLD AFFAIRS COUNCILS

Our JWAC program has been linking students to the world since 2004. With more than 70 chapters in North Texas, JWAC is a great way for high school students to learn about international issues and become more globally aware. JWAC chapters can be started at any high school with students in grades 9-12 with the support of one of the school's teachers.

The Council will help you create a JWAC club for your campus. You and your students will travel beyond classroom walls and pages in textbooks to real-time, firsthand sessions with diplomats, dignitaries, leaders, authors and others who understand global issues and opportunities in business and education. All at no cost!



### HOW TO START A JWAC

- 1. Recruit a group of interested high school students. Any size is fine! Get school approval.
- 2. Elect JWAC officers. If needed, information is provided online.
- 3. Complete the simple JWAC Agreement Form online.



### HOW TO START A JWAC

- 4. Register the sponsor and two officers to attend the annual JWAC Orientation in September.
- 5. Use our meeting ideas and conduct your JWAC meetings.
- 6. Attend our free Global Young Leaders events!

## JWAC CLUB MEETINGS

Your club should meet at least once a month.

Club meetings will take place on your school campus (or online) at a time that is convenient for your members.

JWAC Presidents and VPs are typically responsible for facilitating the meetings.

Meetings can be formatted as information sessions, presentations, discussions, study periods for AWQ, planning period for service projects, or simulations.

## JWAC SERVICE PROJECTS

In September, JWACs are asked to select a cause their members are passionate about on a local and global level. Such issues could include human rights, social entrepreneurship, environmental conservation, etc.

Each JWAC is encouraged to volunteer for at least 10 hours during the academic year. Clubs are also encouraged to fundraise for the organization or cause, if permitted by their school's administration.

The Council will also provide 2+ Service Projects per year if a JWAC Chooses that option.

JWAC sponsors and presidents should also update WACDFW on the service projects completed throughout the year, including photos.

### 20 Under 20

Each spring, the Council accepts nominations for our 20 Under 20 Award which recognizes the 20 top JWAC students around DFW. Nominated students submit their application and those chosen are given an award plus a three-day private leadership training in June.

## Internships with the Council

The Council accepts high school applications for our unpaid internship positions summer. Interns are accepted in each Council department and get real-world experience in a business setting, hear from our prestigious speakers, meet with our board, etc.



## SIX JWAC LEADERSHIP TRAININGS &

## MONTHLY JWAC DISCUSSIONS

Trainings take place over 2-3 hours on weekday evenings or Saturday morning/early afternoon. There is not a registration fee & all JWAC students are welcomed to attend.

Sessions are hosted by local experts who can impart knowledge on the subject to JWAC students through presentations and hands-on activities.

JWAC Discussions are led monthly by the TOP TEN JWAC groups from the prior year. Space for each training is limited so participants MUST pre-register.

## Academic WorldQuest

Annual competition in February, testing students' knowledge of world affairs. Winning team goes to the National WorldQuest in Washington, DC (paid by WAC) in April to compete against teams from around the U.S. Prizes are awarded.

## **International Career Day**

Students attend annual event in fall to learn about volunteering and global careers around the world including: Human Rights, Business, Finance, Technology, Defense, Foreign Service, Education, Journalism, Advertising, Health, Transportation, Energy, etc.


