Discovering the United Arab Emirates

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Subject	Discovering Languages and Culture
Grade Level	6th - 7h grade
Objective	To introduce students to the history, geography, culture, traditions and language of the United Arab Emirates (UAE).

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Discovering the Rich Heritage of the United Arab Emirates



Objectives	Materials	
 -To introduce students to the history and heritage of the United Arab Emirates (UAE). -To explore significant events, cultural traditions, and contributions of the UAE. -To encourage critical thinking, research skills, and cross-cultural understanding. Introduction (10 minutes):		
 Greet the students and provide an overview of the lesson objectives. Ask students what they know about the UAE's history and culture. Write their responses on the chart paper. 		

Historical Background (15 minutes):

1. Show a map of the UAE and explain its geographical location.

2. Provide a brief introduction to the UAE's history, starting from ancient times to modern-day. Highlight significant events such as the Trucial States, the Union of the Emirates, and the UAE's formation in 1971.

Cultural Traditions and Contributions (20 minutes):

1. Discuss the cultural diversity within the UAE, emphasizing the influences of Bedouin, Arab, Persian, and other regional cultures.

- 2. Introduce key aspects of UAE culture, including traditional clothing, food, music, dance, and sports.
- 3. Highlight the UAE's contributions to art, architecture, literature, and advancements in science and technology.

Interactive Activity: Researching UAE Heritage (25 minutes):

1. Divide students into small groups and assign each group a specific topic related to UAE history or culture (e.g., bedouin, seven emirates, Sheikh Zayed, or any other relevant topic).

2. Provide resource materials (books, websites, etc.) for each group to conduct research on their assigned topic. See works cited for more information.

3. Instruct students to create a short presentation or poster summarizing their findings.

4. Allow time for each group to present their research to the class.

Discussion: UAE's Growth and Development (15 minutes):

- 4. Display UAE flags or symbols as a visual reminder of the lesson.

Extension Activities:

1. Assign a creative writing task where students imagine themselves as residents of the UAE during a historical event and write a journal entry about their experience.

2. Organize a cultural fair where students can present their research findings, showcase traditional UAE artifacts, and demonstrate cultural activities.

2 ↔ Unveiling the Geographical Wonders of the United Arab Emirates



Objectives	Materials	
 To introduce middle school students to the geography of the United Arab Emirates (UAE). To explore the diverse landscapes, natural features, and environmental challenges in the UAE. To develop map-reading skills and critical thinking about the impact of geography on human activities. - 1. Greet the students and provide an overview of the lesson objectives.
- 2. Ask students to identify and share what they already know about the geography of the UAE.
- 3. Write their responses on the chart paper to refer back to later

Geographical Feature of the UAE (15 minutes):

1. Show a map of the UAE and highlight the key geographical features, such as the Arabian Gulf, the Gulf of Oman, the Hajar Mountains, and the Rub' al Khali desert (Empty Quarter).

2. Discuss each feature, emphasizing its significance and impact on the climate, natural resources, and human settlement patterns in the UAE.

Climate and Natural Resources (20 minutes):

1. Explore the climate of the UAE, including its hot desert climate, limited rainfall, and extreme temperatures.

Unveiling the Climate of the United Arab Emirates



Objectives	Materials

- 1. Begin by engaging the students in a brief discussion about different types of weather and climates they have experienced.
- 2. Show the students a map and point out the location of the UAE.

Climate Zone and Seasons (15 minutes):

Begin by engaging the students in a brief discussion about the importance of customs and traditions in different cultures.
 Show the students images of UAE cultural symbols or artifacts and ask them to share any prior knowledge or experiences related to the UAE's customs and traditions.

3. Explain that today's lesson will focus on exploring the customs and traditions of the UAE.

The Importance of Hospitality (15 minutes):

- 1. Assign students to research and create a presentation or project about a specific artist or cultural artifact from the Louvre Abu Dhabi collection.
- 2. Organize a class visit to a local museum or art gallery, encouraging students to observe, analyze, and appreciate artworks in person.
- 3. Invite a local artist or art historian to share their experiences and insights related to art, culture, and heritage.

The Palm in Dubai: An Engineering Marvel and Environmental Impact

1. Begin by engaging the students in a discussion about unique architectural and engineering projects around the world.

- 2. Show images of impressive man-made structures and ask students to share their observations and thoughts.
- 3. Explain that today's lesson will focus on exploring The Palm in Dubai, a remarkable man-made island.

Overview of The Palm (15 minutes):

Introduction (10 minutes):

 Encourage students to consider both the positive and negative aspects of such projects in terms of economic benefits and environmental concerns.

Environmental Stewardship (15 minutes):

1. Explain the concept of environmental stewardship and its importance in preserving natural resources and protecting ecosystems.

2. Discuss the measures taken to mitigate the environmental impact of The Palm, such as artificial coral reefs and sustainable construction practices.

Environmental Stewardship (15 minutes) Cont.:

3. Encourage students to brainstorm and share their ideas on how individuals and communities can contribute to environmental stewardship in their own lives.

Reflection and Conclusion (10 minutes):

1. Ask students to individually reflect on what they learned during the lesson and write down one aspect of The Palm project that fascinated them the most.

2. Invite a few students to share their reflections and ideas with the class.

3. Summarize the key takeaways from the lesson, emphasizing the importance of considering the environmental impact of large-scale development projects.


4. Encourage students to continue exploring and learning about sustainable practices and environmental conservation efforts.

Introduction (10 minutes):

4. Encourage students to continue practicing basic Arabic phrases and explore more about Arabic culture and language if they find it intriguing.

Extension Activities:

1. Assign students to research and create a presentation or project about a specific emirate from the UAE, its people, and cultural traditions.

2. Organize a cultural event where students can showcase their knowledge of Arabic language and culture through displays, presentations, or performances.

3. Invite a native Arabic speaker or Arabic language student to the class to share their experiences, language skills, and cultural insights with the students.



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
