A Message From Our President

Reflecting on the Council's fiscal year 2023 (April 2022 - March 2023)

FY2023 was a successful, exhilarating, and full-throttle year. 2022 saw life and programming fully resume, and as the Council proceeded with "business as usual," I want to express deep gratitude to our members, partners, and community on behalf of the Board of Directors and World Affairs Council of Dallas/Fort Worth Staff. The economic uncertainty lingered through the months, and this year's success is no doubt attributed to the hardworking staff, dedicated directors, and stakeholders passionate about our mission.

In 2022, we began a rebrand initiative, a major lift for the Council that is both practical and strategic in nature. We're building the Council's future on a proud 72-year record of educating citizens about civic engagement and world affairs. Our purpose within the North Texas community is as steadfast and clear as the day the Council was founded, as said by our founder H. Neil Mallon, "in the belief that better community education in world affairs is necessary for sound democratic citizenship, and in order to present facts and realistic appraisals, and to foster free and informed discussions on world problems, including economic political and social problems." Today, the world is more interconnected than ever, and the World Affairs Council's mission matters just as much now (if not more) than when it was founded in 1951.

With this rebrand, we aim first to increase the usability, ease, and functionality of the website. The website is our "window on the world," and we want it to be attractive and easy for visitors while showcasing our reputation, gravitas, and contributions to North Texas. Secondly, we want to modernize, forge new partnerships to offer you even more, and grow our membership by engaging with the next generation and reaching broader corners of the region. That's why the Council is rebranding; we are bringing our brand and website up to date, improving infrastructure, and investing in the future of the Council while embracing its strong legacy. FY2023 will see the completion and rollout of this exciting initiative.

The Council returned fully to in-person programming this year with an accompaniment of virtual programs also, including our all-virtual RealTime Report program series created in FY2022. Attendance numbers increased steadily as the community became more and more comfortable with being around others in public. We continued to meet our high standard program quality and diversity for the 70 public speaker programs we hosted in FY2023.

Highlights included: VP Mike Pence, Sec. Mike Pompeo, Dr. Henry Kissinger, State Dept. Spokesman Ned Price, Sir Richard Dearlove, Amb. Nikki Haley, Attorney General Bill Barr, Rep. Roger Williams, Rep. Will Hurd, Lord Mark Sedwill, Jonna Mendez, Jon Meacham, Doug Brinkley, Shalonda Spencer, Susan Glasser, Peter Baker, and Isabel Wilkerson. Additionally, the Council's programming welcomed one head of state: H.E. Albin Kurti of Kosovo, and three foreign Ambassadors: H.E. Karin Olofsdotter of Sweden, H.E. Tone Kajzer of Slovenia, and H.E. Jacques Pitteloud of Switzerland.

The International Visitor Programs department also returned to in-person programming after much anticipation and huge feats of collaboration and planning among the U.S. Department of State, the IVP administrator Global Ties U.S., implementing partners, and the vast network of community-based members such as the Council. We hosted 23 in-person groups with 219 visitors from 88 different countries. We connected these visitors with professional counterparts from organizations including the City of Dallas, Dallas Morning News, ExxonMobil, MoneyGram International, Kosmos Energy, George W. Bush Institute, Dallas Regional Chamber, Southern Methodist University, and the University of Texas at Dallas to explore topics related to U.S. foreign policy goals and objectives. Council volunteers hosted 28 home hospitality dinners, welcoming visitors into their homes to share an evening of conversation, culture, and cuisine.

Relationship building was again paramount during the year, and we look forward to continuing these important friendships and partnerships. The success of our Council relies on your engagement and generous membership, and so it is with deep gratitude that I thank you for your contributions and commitment to helping us make a strong impact. As we set our view on the horizon of the next 72 years, please continue your membership and support to help spread the word of the importance of our mission. I am incredibly proud of the work we accomplished this year and cannot wait to see our future unfold in the months and years ahead. Together, we will thrive.



In an era marked by polarization and division, we have remained steadfast in our commitment to promoting civil discourse. Our events are designed not just to inform, but to facilitate respectful conversations among attendees with differing viewpoints.

This past December, we hosted Pulitzer Prize-winning author and bestselling Presidential Historian Jon Meacham to discuss his new book And There Was Light: Abraham Lincoln and the American Struggle. Meacham thematically spoke throughout the evening about the importance of civil discourse in our time, which is accomplished through respectful and open dialogue.





The Council was honored to have Dr. Condoleezza Rice as the keynote speaker for the 39th Annual H. Neil Mallon Award Dinner. Dr. Rice reminded the audience that the foundation of a healthy democracy comes when citizens exchange ideas and debate our differences, which in turn enables us to progress forward.

Education

Driving Lasting Change for Students and Teachers

The Council's Global Young Leaders program impacted almost 10,000 students and over 1,000 teachers this past year. It's the only education initiative in North Texas focused on global and cultural competence, with Junior World Affairs Council clubs on 65 local high school campuses (public, private, charter, and homeschooled).

The Global Young Leaders program serves to prepare the next generation of North Texas residents to compete in the global economy, gain global competence skills to solve complex problems, create opportunities for all, and advance shared respect for human dignity. Students are transformed from observers into informed international participants by learning global competency skills through educational programs focused on diplomatic leadership and civic engagement.

We are at a pivotal moment in history where it is critical that we engage and inspire the next generation of global citizens to lead productive lives and contribute to their communities with strength, empathy, and a global perspective. We believe equipping students with global and cultural competency skills has the power to change our local communities, nation, and the world for the better.

Office of Protocol

The Office of Protocol works with local government, city officials, the diplomatic corps, and other international stakeholders to represent North Texas in official international activities.



Our protocol contract continues to support the City of Dallas as the liaison for international diplomacy in DFW. Working closely with the Mayor's office, Dallas City Council, and the Consular Corp, this important partnership continues to flourish as we increase Dallas' reputation as an international city. Manager of Protocol Macs Reynolds is frequently asked to assist with special projects on behalf of the mayor and council members and the newly designated Dallas International District. Managing events such as the Mayor's State of the City address, press conferences, and private meetings with high level dignitaries, Macs continues to solidify his presence in Dallas' international framework.

In February, the Council partnered with the City of Dallas to host the 2023 Mayor's Consular Corps Summit, celebrating 85 years of the Dallas Consular Corps. Over 60 countries were represented by their respective consulates, including many visiting from the Houston and Austin areas.

The Council has hosted or coordinated several high-level visits on behalf of the City and individual members of the Consular Corps. Visitors have included the Honorable Kazuko Kohri, Mayor of Sendai, Her Excellency Karin Olofsdotter, Ambassador of Sweden to the U.S., His Excellency Radovan Javorčík, Ambassador of the Slovak Republic to the U.S., among others.

We provided logistical and cultural expertise for Mayor Johnson's trip to Doha, Qatar for the prestigious Qatar Economic Forum, featuring heads of state, global business leaders, policymakers, and technology innovators exploring economic trends driving global growth. In addition, we provided planning and logistical support for the 2023 City of Dallas and Mayor's inauguration.

Macs Reynolds and Liz Brailsford represent the Council on the planning committee for the Dallas International District, working alongside Dallas City Council members, the surrounding business community, and the DFW Consular Corps to increase international representation and the number of trade offices in Dallas.

International Visitor Programs

The International Visitor Programs department continued to host and provide meaningful and robust programming for international visitors while working with its international exchange network to prepare for the return to in-person programming. Under the leadership of the U.S. Department of State's Office of International Visitors, the Council worked with partner agencies and organizations to determine community readiness and best practices for moving forward safely and is now confidently positioned to welcome the world back to North Texas.






